PYO gets set for 2016 tour

Perth Youth Orchestra has enjoyed a series of successful concert tours across the UK and in Europe over the past fifty years. Previous tours have taken the orchestra to performances in England, Spain, France, Germany, Netherlands, Estonia, Poland and Italy.

Each one has brought great acclaim for the orchestra, both abroad and at home. They have provided the finest opportunities for our young musicians to perform to the highest level.

Plans for 2016 are already well underway and our destination is Prague, capital city of the Czech Republic.

Musical talent has long flourished in Prague and in the 17th and 18th centuries it was known as the conservatory of Europe.

After leaving Vienna, Mozart found a receptive audience here, and wrote a symphony to his adopted home (Symphony No 38).

Prague is also the birthplace of the great composers Antoní Dvořák, Leoš Janáček and Bedřich Smetana.

The Perth Youth Orchestra committee feels confident that it can support plans for a concert tour in July 2016 and is seeking sponsorship on your behalf to ensure that it is affordable to the greatest number of families.

The proposed tour dates are from Monday 4th – Monday 11th July 2016, and are subject to confirmation.

At this stage please check them against your family holidays, school trips and other potential clashes.

Early estimates of the cost suggest that it will be no more than our last tour - £995.

We can also give guidance and support to families who may wish to do their own personal fund raising.

It is likely that there will be a discount for second and subsequent family members in the orchestra.

The tour is open to all our existing members and some places are being held for the new players who will successfully audition for the new season.

Families will be contacted early next month with an invitation to express an interest in taking part in the tour.

This will be followed, in May, with more detailed information, and a request for a formal commitment to the tour.

If your child wishes to join the tour, a deposit will be requested on 25th June, with 12 monthly instalments to follow.

The Barnett Formula for Success



For the present members of PYO the 1960s are probably like the dark ages, but the impact that Louis Barnett made all these years ago is as vivid to me now as it was at the first rehearsals of the orchestra. There is no doubt in my mind that PYO would never have got going without Louis Barnett.

At a time when the musical and political establishment of Perth were at best lukewarm to the idea of a youth orchestra, he pretty much single handedly got the whole idea off the ground. He wouldn't take no for an answer. After all he had already been instrumental in setting up Perth Symphony Orchestra in the early fifties, so why not a youth orchestra?

What was he like? An amazing mixture, an individualist certainly, and as an ex-military musician, (hence I guess his being called Reg). There was absolutely no doubting his discipline...always "Mr Barnett", and he certainly had no patience with timewasters or anvone who wasn't serious about orchestras - that went for players as well as the local authority.

A disciplinarian maybe, but also someone of humour, intelligence, principle and sensitivity.

My mother was on the first committee and always remarked on his reports, models of the English language, and always filled with kind encouragement and 100% support for those who supported him.

That discipline and his charismatic though self effacing personality, would indicate a natural conductor. He was certainly that, but virtually no other conductor in my experience has been as selfless; it was all about the orchestra and the young people, never about him.

It was absolutely typical that he and cofounder John Davie returned the tiny honorarium they were offered, so as to boost the fund for instruments.

In the early days instruments were in short supply.

The Euphonium is hardly an orchestral instrument of note, and

was certainly something of a misnomer in my hands, but I was recruited to play a bassish line, laboriously arranged and handwritten by Mr Barnett, to cover for the lack of horns, bassoons, trombones and double basses. Changed days now.

With Mr Barnett I learned the lesson.... 'watch the conductor'. Now I find myself still looking at conductors.. at times in the vain hope of either help or inspiration.

His energy and enthusiasm were immense and his untimely death could easily have have meant the end of the whole idea.

The seed he planted had however taken root, and over fifty years on it is a pleasure to see it flourishing so marvellously.

My interest in music was transformed by Louis Barnett. An amazing legacy for Perth and a remarkable man.


